A Life Well Lived

Friends, Romans, Countrymen; lend me your ear. We come to remember Mr. Bubbles, not to praise him. I begin with an attempt at humor because that's what Grover wanted - not the typical flowery eulogy but a recounting of those facets of his life which describe the beautiful person he was - one we shall long remember - with warts included. I'll get to the "Mr. Bubbles" thing in a minute, but first ...

Susan, Amanda, Jacob – you have your own memories of this husband and father who provided you with many wonderful years, and a map to follow as you travel down your own path in the garden of life. While none of us is perfect, I'll wager with some certainty that your memory of Mr. Bubbles is fond indeed because I was fortunate enough to grow close to him in the time we had together. I came to know just what kind of a magnificent man he was. Grover C Wolfe was a good friend, enthusiastic playmate, and wonderful human being. It is a distinct privilege and great honor for me to say a few words about him.

Mr. Bubbles gained admission to a brotherhood some of us formed many years ago which provides us with an opportunity to engage in outdoor activities, tell outrageous lies, have some great meals together, and solve all the world's social and political problems around a campfire or across a dinner table; and he was one of our most valued members. In one way or another, Mr. Bubbles made significant contributions to almost all of our most hilarious gatherings during the times he was with us.

This small but enthusiastic group of friends was held together for many years by generous amounts of laughter and camaraderie - laughter at the world as we saw it and laughter at ourselves. Mr.

Bubbles was instrumental in providing us with insight into the humorous facets of life in the 21st century and even made us stop to consider a more serious topic now and then.

He earned the dubious distinction of being the only member of the fraternity permanently banned from kitchen clean up at our clubhouse. In an effort to be helpful without being asked, Mr. Bubbles loaded the dishwasher one morning and poured a generous helping of liquid dishwashing detergent into the machine. Not the kind of liquid formulated for machine washing, mind you; but the kind used to form soapy water for handwashing. After a while, some of us noticed an inch or two of soap bubbles across the kitchen floor and forced a confession out of the thoroughly embarrassed perpetrator. So, now you know why we called Grover "Mr. Bubbles".

Grover was not a bombastic, aggressive, or overbearing sort of personality, but that doesn't mean he didn't command attention when he spoke. Mr. Bubbles frequently laid out a topic that made us all stop to ponder some serious question about the purpose of life and just as often provided a thoughtful perspective on its meaning - sometimes serious and sometimes tongue-in-cheek.

When each of us looks back on what we've done with our lives, few will be able to say that they've made a significant impact. Mr. Bubbles, on the other hand, had a meaningful influence on those with whom he came in contact. We are richer for having known him and will treasure our memories. We mourn our loss and rejoice in our memories of him.
